to my age, I'm viewed as a veteran in the field. My veteran status brings opportunities to consult with people who are thinking of starting a ministry like ours. I always try to be gracious in these situations, remembering how overwhelmed we felt at first and how much we appreciated any words of wisdom from people who were doing work similar to what we envisioned doing.

One of the things that I always mention is that there are essentially two kinds of orphanages or children's homes in the world: those that place their children for adoption and those that do not. I mention this because the types of facilities and services offered in these two kinds of programs are quite different. Preparing children for adoption, like we do at CSC, has a big impact on the types of facilities we provide, the number and skills of staff that we hire, the record keeping we do and the quality of medical and psychological care given to our children.

At CSC, everything we do is influenced by a goal to see our children join adoptive families. We keep scrupulous records for each child, including medical developmental histories, and behavioral summaries and school records. Every doctor's visit, medical test or medicine administered recorded. is Developmental milestones are chronicled. School progress is carefully documented. All of these will eventually be used in preparing the papers needed for adoption for our children.

The most important document in this paperwork is the child study report written by our social workers. This report includes the circumstances of the referral of the child to CSC, his or her condition on admission, family history (if known), a summary of the developmental and medical history of the child, his or her current functioning, an explanation of the child's legal status and qualifications to be

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was out speaking at a Kiwanis Club the other day. It used to be when I spoke about CSC I would try to squeeze as much information as I could in the timeframe I was given. Though we may feel small, there's a lot of sophistication that has happened at CSC over the years. We have been intentional about getting better at serving our children. We've also been intentional about serving donors who care for the children with their giving.

With that in mind, I want to remind you that CSC can handle giving options that you might not first think of when you imagine a child shelter on a little island far away.

We have a comfort level with arranging planned gifts. Those who have given to us in their will have made a tremendous impact on the work.

In addition. we have an endowment. It's \$500,000 and the more we grow it the more we help secure this ministry's future. We rejoice over gifts to that as we do those to our operating programs.

Perhaps one of those things is on your mind, and you could see yourself giving in a new way. We'd love to help you do so. We'll keep being a personal ministry and can help you keep it that way for years to come.

adopted, and a recommendation concerning the placement of the child in an adoptive home. These child study reports are comprehensive and can be rather lengthy, especially when they include the cases of siblings.

Completed Child Study Reports are the result of the teamwork of many people at CSC. Our social workers incorporate a variety of reports in their work. Our nurses offer the medical records of doctors' visits, medications and immunizations given, included. Lindsay Abong and Jinkee Reasoner of our CD team draw from the reports of house parents and child care workers as well as counselors and teachers regarding the behavior and development of the children. Lots of meetings, consultation, and exchange of information goes into preparing these essential reports. Our Social Work Director, Klaris Cabansal, edits the reports and, together with birth and surrender documents, pictures and other papers, they are sent to comprehensive, accurate and well-written.

Teamwork is essential at CSC. Our staff consists of people with expertise and experience in many different areas. We have nurses, therapists, teachers, counselors, child care workers and social workers, all pooling their talents for the completion of these reports and for the care and benefit of the children that God brings into our homes.

It is a pleasure to be a part of this staff and to see the benefits of

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illnesses, hospitalizations, and tests administered. Our Child Development team provides the developmental reports for the child, which include developmental milestones and social, cognitive, and language progress. For older children, psychological tests and counseling summaries are also the Department of Social Welfare and Development for review. Eventually they will be read by many people in government offices, foreign adoption agencies and embassies, and prospective adoptive parents. So it is very important that these child study reports be extremely teamwork in the everyday work at the Shelter, and in the preparation of children and their paperwork for the adoption process that is at the heart of our ministry in Cebu.

As is the case with many organizations and teams, CSC has a group of people whose work is done behind the scenes, but who are critically important to the success and efficient operation of the ministry. In our Sun Valley facility in Cebu, among the social workers and administrators, is the hard working and talented office staff without whom nothing would happen at CSC.

The first face you see when entering the CSC office is Vanjing, our multi-talented administrative assistant. She knows just about everything that goes on at CSC. She answers the phone, types reports, handles the immigration work for our expatriate staff, files papers with government offices and keeps track of appointments for our administrative staff. She handles her duties with efficiency and enthusiasm and can multitask as well as anyone at CSC.

As you enter the inner part of the office you will see Maribel at her computer. Maribel is responsible for paying CSC's bills. She calculates the payments, cuts the checks and sees that all our vendors are paid on time.

Across from her desk is Angie's. Angie is our cashier. She prepares the payroll for our 125 employees and handles disbursements and reimbursements for the many staff requesting money for their travels, case management and purchases. Her work is very detail oriented, and you can often see her counting money and working on payroll spreadsheets. The last person you will see in the business area of our office is Ging. She is our accountant and office manager. She supervises the work of the other office personnel, does much of CSC's banking and creates the financial statements for the ministry. She frequently confers with staff concerning budgets and helps them with financial decisions that affect the day-today operations of the ministry.

CSC's financial office is an important part of the ministry. We are blessed to have these four women who are talented, reliable and honest, helping to manage the funds that God has provided for the smooth operation of CSC.

Wilmar has lived at CSC since he was seven months old. He is an amazing young man. Wilmar has medical issues and developmental delays, but he doesn't let that slow him down! He has a fun, infectious personality and likes to be the center of attention. He has lots of energy and spends a lot of time on the playground and enjoys playing basketball. Wilmar is known at CSC as the best free-throw shot around. He rarely misses!

Wilmar has been diagnosed with cerebral palsy with left hemiplegia, cognitive delay with possible autism spectrum disorder, hypothyroidism and mild hearing loss. He receives supportive services such as physical and speech therapy.



The best family for Wilmar is a home that is nurturing, structured and has a strong support system. Wilmar's family must be open to multiple appointments with medical specialists and community service providers, and they must be willing to follow through with recommendations to meet his needs. If Wilmar isn't placed in the next few months, he will lose his chance to be adopted.

Michael came to CSC in 2012. He is a quiet, sweet child. He is loyal to others and a good friend. Caregivers have noted he is very considerate of others. When Michael arrived at the shelter, he was behind in school. Over the last few years, he has made significant improvements. He has gained more confidence, and we have seen progress in all areas. Science is his favorite subject this year. Michael also enjoys outdoor activities including soccer and basketball.

Michael has moderate or severe hearing loss. He currently wears hearing aides. He has clear speech and can easily communicate his needs. Michael could benefit from more appropriate hearing devices or even surgery in his future. Our hope is that a family will step forward to adopt him that could offer this
