-HOPE TO TRAGEDY

Tragedy is a part of life our children. For some, tragic events have already occurred before they are a few years old. For little Jaybee (not her real name), coming to live at CSC was just about the first positive thing that happened in her life.


We were told about Jaybee by her father, who came to the office to seek help for an injury.

He had been in trouble with the law for several years. Our social workers knew him and did their best to help him get the medical attention he needed. He and Jaybee's mom had separated, and he was trying to care for the baby but did not have any stable place to live or money to provide food for her. We agreed to take her in temporarily while her parents could make permanent plans for her.

In cases like this our social workers have lots of counseling to do. They know that decisions about a child's future should not be made hastily during times of crisis. Extended family members need to be consulted. Wounds need to begin healing. Everyone involved in her life needs time to examine and discuss what is in her best interest. CSC stands beside people in crisis to offer temporary or long-term placement for children in need of residential care, and to work for their eventual permanent placement.

Jaybee's life has been affected by tragedy. We cannot change that reality. But we can intervene in a way that offers some peace of mind and a measure of hope for her family, and a safe, loving, and healthy environment where she can live for as long as our services are needed.
