

Just when we thought we were making progress, another letter would come in the mail requiring a different course of action.

During all this time of waiting, Mary Irene and Justin were making an amazing transition to life at CSC. Mary Irene had two major plastic surgeries on her arms to release

Before children come to CSC, their lives are just plain difficult. They experience pain, isolation, fear and hunger. They want hope but

cannot find it. They want a birthday party but have no idea when their birthday is. They want a bed and make do with cardboard on the ground. They want to learn but have no opportunity to attend school. They yearn to be wanted but are not sure they ever will be.

But when they get to CSC, they join a fraternity of fellow learners. Author Bryan Stevenson says:

"When you experience mercy, you learn things that are hard to learn otherwise. You see things that you can't otherwise see; you hear things you can't otherwise hear. You begin to recognize **the humanity that resides in each of us."** The children at CSC struggle like all kids do. They argue about whose turn it is to use the skateboard, who isn't calling fouls in basketball, and who is not doing their chores. They're just kids.

CSC children are also shining examples of understanding the humanity that resides in each of us. Their painful and difficult experiences are filled with lessons in compassion and mercy. It never ceases to amaze me how they accept each other. They have no word for

In some ways, the last days of waiting are the hardest as we anticipate the phone call telling us that the visas have been released and the family can come get their amazing children. All the filing of papers, waiting in lines, starting over, knocking on doors, and looking for creative strategies has resulted in a very good thing for these two gifts from God.

We appreciate the many people who stand with us in this ministry. Your prayers result in the needed patience and stamina for us to keep fighting hard for our kids as we navigate through frustrating and confusing bureaucracy and attend to the children's many needs.

If you spend any time with Cherry Mae, you will quickly learn that she is very witty and likes to joke around. anxiety she has about her future. She has called CSC home for over five years, and although she loves living at CSC, she dreams of leaving CSC someday with an adoptive family.

Globally, the number of adoptions has been declining drastically over the past few years, and this has been true at CSC as well. Children like Cherry Mae are having to change their dreams. For over 40 years, we have given hope to kids by teaching them that God sees their situation and has great things in store for them. This is still true even with the changing landscape of adoption. At CSC we are working with our teens to know that they can have a beautiful future even if adoption doesn't happen. Over this past year we have developed a life skills curriculum, targeted towards our teens, to intentionally equip

This holistic program covers everything from understanding friendships and financial literacy to automotive skills and making decisions for a healthy lifestyle. Our teens, like Cherry Mae, need to know that God has wonderful plans for them, and we are here to be their family as they work to reach those goals.
