## TWENTY FIVE years of specialized education

Twenty Five ago, we saw the need for a school at CSC, to meet the educational needs of our residents. The children living at the shelter were attending school in the local community. Some of them came to the shelter quite behind academically, and they were struggling to catch up. We were able to build the school just a short walk from the shelter,

allowing the students to walk back and forth to school, returning for lunch midday at the shelter. Our school has seen many improvements over the years. We have expanded the staff, improved curriculum, and worked to meet the needs of the students on an individualized basis. Our low student to teacher ratios of around 7:1 allow us to help children catch up academically and meet individualized goals. Each child has regular conferences to monitor their progress, and those in their lives attend, including house parents, teachers, home life staff and others. To commemorate the 25th anniversary of the school, we held a special celebration. In addition to a program with speeches and videos, we had many fun activities with the children, including arts and crafts, Filipino games and dances.
