### Loving Perseverance: CSC's Commitment to Three Siblings

Our staff in Cebu has an unwavering commitment to the children God brings to our door. Sometimes that takes an extraordinary amount of time and resources, as in the case of Christian, Duan, and Phoeby Gayle, three innocent children who came into our care three and a half years ago. While the background of the children's case had its challenges, as most of their cases do, we did not anticipate any un-

usual difficulties in helping these children have a family. But a difficulty would soon arise that we had not faced before.

It is not unusual for children at CSC to have unique medical needs. In fact, happens with

some regularity. God seems to give us the opportunity to care for children who have needs that would not be adequately met elsewhere. It is not often, however, that we know about these special needs at the time that children are admitted to the shelter, even though they undergo a thorough medical evaluation and testing. Often we find out about them months later. That was the situation with one of the children in this group of three.

About a year and a half after Phoeby Gayle came to the shelter, it became apparent that recurrent illnesses were not just the usual viruses our children get. They happened with such regularity and would follow a similar pattern. Our medical team and Phoeby Gayle became regular visitors at the pediatric pulmonologist and nephrologist, both wonderful doctors who have treated many of CSC's children over the years. After some time, Phoeby Gayle was diagnosed with nephritic syndrome, a condition where the kidneys are not functioning normally and fluid retention

occurs. Frequent hospitalizations ensued, a kidney biopsy was necessary, and a regimen of medications began until Phoeby Gayle started to develop a dependence on them. We were very concerned about the toll it was taking on her then two-yearold body. Many CSC supporters and prayer partners can remember the regular requests for prayer for Phoeby Gayle during that time.



All of this transaround the pired time Christian, Duan, and Phoeby Gayle became eligible for adoptive placement. were not sure what impact Phoeby Gayle's diagnosis would have on the lengthy placement process

for a sibling group. The medical prognosis for nephritic syndrome in a young child is somewhat uncertain, but our medical team worked with our doctors to put together the many test results and doctors' certifications necessary for an adoptive family who might consider Phoebe and her siblings.

As the children's placement paperwork was already with the Philippine intercountry adoption office, we began to work with their social workers to be proactive in finding a Christian family for these children who would be willing to accept a child with Phoeby Gayle's special medical needs. We repeatedly emphasized the need to have Phoeby Gayle and her siblings placed at the soonest possible time so she could receive any advanced medical care that was not available to her in the Philippines.

A few possibilities for placement failed to pan out before they even got anywhere,

Eventually I figured out what a miss that perspective was. Meals in Cebu are something to behold. We're feeding children who spent some portion of their lives unable to rely on mealtime. And it's more than that. Meals are a precious time of connecting over a shared need.

I took this picture last time I was in Cebuinstead of a fish. It was my pleasure to be invited to eat supper in the Eicher Home.



On the left is Dondon, the house father in Eicher. He and his wife Ivy live onsite, just like the other three sets of house parents who work at CSC. They are the first line of care for our kids.

We were having a great conversation that night, and a great meal. On the right is James, who lives at CSC with his two sisters.

When I look at that picture I wonder how many men made James feel the way Dondon does before he called CSC home. I don't know, but the smile on James' face can't be faked. There is an exceptional young man: fed, safe and laughing. Thanks to you, he is at home.



In August, we sent out an urgent letter to our faithful supporters. The dog days of summer were hitting our bottom line and we found ourselves

\$60,000 behind budget. It was hard not to worry, and we decided the best thing we could do is tell our friends what was happening.



Shortly after the appeal was sent, we got a reply from an adoptive family. The message? "We'd be honored to cover your shortfall." We could hardly believe it. Did they mean all of it?

That was exactly what they meant. Thanks to this family and the generous response of others, we were able to get back on track in 2012!

We continue to be on a suitable pace through October, as we track slightly above budget. We praise God for that, as we had a significant budget increase this year.

We're heading into the biggest months of our financial year. November and December account for 29% of our income for the year, and

> we will need to raise \$490,000 to keep doing our work.

> That's a big number, but we have supporters with big hearts and a big commitment to CSC.

Most importantly, we serve a big God who has proven his faithfulness to us over and over.

We ask for your prayers and, if you are able, your gifts as well.

We have budgeted carefully and spent wisely, and look forward to racing to the finish for our kids in Cebu!

and we wondered if these children might not have the chance for a family. By this time we had found it necessary to semi-isolate Phoeby Gayle in her home so she would not be so susceptible to viruses that led to hospitaliza-

tions so regularly. The playroom became her room in the home and she had one-on-one care for many months. She was able to spend time with her siblings and a few others each day as long as they were healthy, but her socialization was limited in an attempt to keep her healthy. Like all the other children in our homes, these three had prayed for years for an adoptive family. And God was faithful to their prayers and those of so many others who knew of Phoeby Gayle's condition. It was a blessed day when all of us on the staff and their houseparents were able to share the news of a loving adoptive family with these children.



For more than three years our staff and medical team have persevered to give these three wonderful children the best opportunity possible to have a family to call their own. And for that entire time Christian, Duan, and, eventually, Phoeby Gayle, persevered to pray for a mom and a dad. God has honored that perseverance by turning a challenging situation into a great blessing. We need not wonder why God brings these children with challenging needs to our front door.

## Graduates Move on to Figger Challenges in Life

Four CSC students recently graduated from three different schools, both in Cebu and internationally. Argei Kim and Angelica completed their elementary education at our Children of Hope School, while Kirk Pilapil graduated from Trinity West University in Canada. We are so proud of each of them for their perseverance and good work.

Argei Kim is in our Children of Hope School Bridge program, in preparation for starting high school next year. He needs to brush up his skills in Tagalog (the national language of the Philippines, which is taught more intensely in local schools) and other subjects that might be presented differently outside of CHS. He and his three siblings live in the Duterte Home and have been with us for more than six years. Argei Kim is excited to begin high school and experience the increased independence that goes with it.

Angelica also is in the CHS Bridge program. She and her sister have been matched with an adoptive family, so she will be continuing her education in the United States. Her Bridge studies will be heavily









weighted with American history and culture to prepare her for her coming challenges.

Arleen proudly marched across the stage in March to receive her diploma from Cebu Normal University. She graduated with a Bachelor of Elementary Education degree. Arleen was in various schools, including CHS, for more than 20 years. Often she was the only blind student in the entire school, and she had to work extra hard to learn Braille and utilize it in her studies. She is currently searching for a job. Her life's desire is to teach music to blind students.

Kirk received his Bachelor of Arts in Education degree, with honors, from Trinity Western in May. After completing his practice teaching he took a job in Redvers, Saskatchewan, and is teaching first grade as well as some special education classes. Kirk was a graduate of CHS and Cebu Normal University before receiving a generous gift to attend school in Canada.

We are so proud of these graduates, and thankful that we had the chance to participate in their education, through our Children of Hope School, and by providing additional opportunities for them to reach their goals and chase their dreams.

project to support. Some families, particularly at Christmas time, want an alternative to family gift exchanges. We have tried to include projects with a wide range of prices to provide lots of options. Some are special, one-time needs, often not in our budget but much needed, while others, like feeding the children in one home for a day (\$33), are recurring expenses.

One of our newest projects involves little Carl John, a seven-month-old baby admitted when he was two weeks old. The nurses and caregivers noted weakness in his legs and other developmental issues. He was assessed by a neurologist who did a nerve conduction test that showed irregularities. He needs to have an expensive nerve biopsy in Manila, which will cost \$1,700.

We call Jamaica "JamJam" because there is already a little girl named Jaimaica, and another named Nicole in the same nursery. Both of these little darlings are healthy. Jamaica is quite mischievous and full of giggles. Sarah already smiles easily and loves to eat.



Maylen (8 months) has lived with us for seven months already. She is a healthy and good-natured little dar-Her older siblings Lemuel (9), Carlo (7) and Rhean (3) joined her at CSC during the last week in September. Lemuel and Carlo are very small for their age-but that goes for size only. They are full of energy and joy. They think that CSC is the "most beautiful" place they have seen and have no words to describe going to school—just lots of noise and activity while trying to check everything out. Rhean is a little quieter than her big brothers but certainly has the potential to be just like them...that glint of mischievousness is in her eyes too!



Junalyn (11) and Jhona (11) are twins who came to live with us the middle of September, only days after their birth mother died. They have had a tough life, being raised by their single mom who was sickly all their lives. They have thanked us over and over again for bringing them to CSC. Junalyn (short hair) spends lots of time each day giving hugs. Her hugs are given with much emotion and strength! We decided she is easily one of the "CSC Top Ten Huggers" of all time. We may be awarding her the number one spot! Jhona (long hair) is not quite as demonstrative but she likes to write notes thanking us for rescuing her and telling us how excited and happy she is that she can go to school and has a safe place to live. Both Junalyn and Jhona are proud

to tell visitors that they now have shoes and a Bible of their very own.

We have also added three darling babies, each of whom arrived when they were less than one month old.



Danniel (3 months) is a healthy little guy: he is doing well.

**Jhules** (3 months) has been sickly all of his short life; he has been in and out of the hospital and has spent more time in isolation than he



has in our nursery. We will be doing some lab work and will have medical tests done to try to find out why he is so sickly. Cynth Zaniah (2 months)

### Referrals

Much goes into admitting new children to our homes. The process involves our social workers, nurses and child care team. Equally important are the people who refer the children to us. The government social worker who referred Junalyn and Jhona had brought twins to CSC more than ten years ago. She had been impressed with our facilities and people, and wanted the girls to have a place where they would be safe and loved. She really cared for these girls and was thrilled when CSC agreed to take them in. She accompanied them to Cebu City from a small

town in the southern part of the island. Her compassion, matched with ours, gave these beautiful girls a chance to experience good things in their lives and to have a brighter future.

Sometimes the referring person is a hospital social worker, a local government official or a concerned citizen. We have had a number of referrals from our own workers who know about children who need the life-changing care and love that CSC provides.
