

IN SPITE OF UNCERTAINTIES ABOUT THE FUTURE JOEVANIE GRABS Hold of Life at CSC

L ife isn't fair. That is an expression that we hear a lot, and one that parents often use with their children. But for Joevanie and his siblings, it has been a defining statement of their lives. If anyone has a claim to the unfairness of life, it would be Joevanie.

Joevanie and his siblings grew up in abject poverty. Their father was a driver of a bicycle taxi, and his daily earnings were rarely enough to provide for the basic needs of his five children. His mother helped out by making necklaces, but the pay was low and she struggled to put meals on the table. They were often hungry and there was no money for medicine. Life was painful. But it would soon get worse.

On December 3, 2006, a baby brother, James, was born. But there was not much time to celebrate his birth. Two days later their mom died. She had by Paul Healy

been sick with high blood pressure, and the strain of childbirth, coupled with poor nutrition, was too much for her. Suddenly, Joevanie's life changed dramatically. He could no longer go to school, as he needed to care for his siblings. They went to live with relatives who weren't able to provide them with the food they needed. Their father's health was not good, and he could not work regularly. So Joevanie would go to the garbage dump to forage for items he could sell. He was becoming despondent, never sure if there would be food for their next meal. But things were soon going to get worse.

On September 8 of 2007, just nine months after the death of his mom, Joevanie's father also died. Now there would be no income at all, and there would be further responsibilities and worries for Joevanie.

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Our Capital Campaign

t was the best of times; it was the worst of times. Well, that's a bit dramatic, but there is a feel of a tale of two ministries at CSC today.

Our banquet attendees set a record for attendance and giving for the second consecutive year, and a few days later a foundation upped an annual gift from \$14,000 to \$34,000. These blessings have been cause for a lot of celebration at CSC! We've had to draw out of our reserves a couple times already in 2008, and that week of April goes a long way towards keeping us out of them for a while.

As I shared at the banquet, the capital campaign has entered into a critical time. We are facing the reality that the business deal surrounding our largest pledge is back at square one, and the risk that the gift has been jeopardized. And due to the slumping dollar and the unavailability of this pledge and another that is delayed, we face the possibility of having to halt construction, possibly as early as the end of May.

We believe God is teaching us something. It is our understanding that we are to move forward. The news of that large gift being at risk came the very day Paul and I were meeting to consider our approach to the remainder of the campaign. The construction has begun and all four new buildings are needed for our work.

We are pursuing new "lead" donors to consider the kinds of gifts that would lift our numbers quickly. We have a plan to share the campaign with adoptive families, donors and other new potential supporters. If there was a feeling a year ago that since big gifts were coming "they may not need me," we see clearly that is not the case. We need you. We'd be so honored to have your support of the campaign and all the kids that will be served through it.

Capital Campaign Gifts Build Hope for the Future

Ithough economic downturns and difficult situations for some of our donors make things a bit urgent for our building work in Cebu, we continue to praise God for what he has done.

Two of the four new buildings are currently about 35% complete. Jacob's House is being prepared to have the second story concrete floor poured in mid-May. The medical building's walls are now going in and the steel structure is going up in preparation for the installation of the roof. Site development is going on that will tie both buildings together with handicap accessible ramps and bridges.

Gifts to our campaign give hope for the completion of these buildings and for all the great ministry opportunities they will provide in the years to come.

Help for Joevanie and his family came in the form of an angel - a pastor's wife in their community who is the sister of Cherne Home houseparent Pureza. Because Joevanie always did his best to bring his family to church, she knew about their plight, and contacted CSC to see if we might be able to help them. Eventually, when things got especially grim, the children stayed at the church, depending on the pastor and his family for food and care. They have their own kids and couldn't offer help for very long.

The sad plight of this family brought our staff to tears and, in spite of crowded conditions in the homes, we decided to take them in. One of the deciding factors was Joevanie, his heart for his family, and his perseverance through tragedies.

Coming to live at CSC has been a life-changing experience for Joevanie, and not one that he takes for granted. He continues to care deeply about his siblings, but he is grabbing all the opportunities that his new life has given him. He is working hard at our school to prepare himself for eventually going to high school, and he is enthusiastically participating in the life of the Teen Home, where he is staying. He knows that this opportunity is a gift from God and he wants to make the most of it.

Lots of uncertainties remain for Joevanie. Since he is almost 17, adoption may not be an option for him. He will need to start high school this year, venturing outside of the friendly confines of our Children of Hope School. But Joevanie has learned a lot about trusting God, and he will put those lessons to use in the coming months and years as he grabs hold of the opportunities and challenges that CSC has presented him!

"When I was told that there was a chance for us at CSC I felt more secure. Most of all, I was happy that someone will take care of us, that we will have something to eat and that if my siblings get sick someone will attend to them. I felt and knew that God had answered our prayers."

Danielle (4 months) came to live with us in late January. She had been abandoned in a local govern-

ment hospital shortly after she was born. She weighed 2.8 pounds at birth. but gained weight well when mothers in the nursery took turns breast-



feeding her. Danielle is a happy, smiling baby who charms everyone who has the pleasure to meet her. She has been very healthy during her stay in the Eicher Home.



Rowela (3) is full of personality and energy. She came to us in early April. She has two brothers at CSC who were admitted several

months ahead of her. Rowela is not the least bit shy with any of her caregivers. She has a big smile for everyone and has a great sense of

humor and fun. She seems thrilled to be at CSC. Rowela is very healthy.

John Niño (4 months) was one of five babies that we admitted dur-

ing a two week period in January. He came from the same hospital as Danielle and was admitted on the same dav. He



was abandoned at one day old, and, like Danilelle, was breastfed by kind mothers in the nursery. He loves to be held and cuddled. He is starting to coo and is trying to roll over. He is a healthy little guy and seems to be on track developmentally.

Joshua (2) is Rowela's younger brother and was admitted in

January. They had lived on the streets with their birth mom. who has been a single parent and homeless for



several years. Joshua is a happy little guy who loves to be around people, whether adults or other toddlers.





Marv Hadenfelt, a CSC supporter from Alaska came during March to hang out with the kids and learn more about CSC.

He is very affectionate. He likes to ride on the toy car with his buddies, and play outside. He is starting to say some words. He is a very good eater and has grown amazingly fast. Although he was guite sick with pneumonia and parasites when he first came to live with us, he is now very healthy.

Jeralyn (14 months) is the twin sister of Jovan, who was featured in our last newsletter. She came to live with us on March 5. She had been living with someone that the birthmother knew, and was cared for

well so didn't suffer from malnutrition like her twin. She is doing well physically, but has had a hard time learning to share the attention of



her caregivers with the other kids in the nursery. She walks well and is getting to know her twin, whom she hasn't seen since they were newborns. We are so happy that we were able to reunite Jeralyn and Jovan. They are one of four sets of twins at CSC.



Central Baptist Church of St. Paul, Minnesota held a camp for our kids at a beach resort in southern Cebu. Their team planned, staffed and underwrote the costs of the camp.





Tim Erickson led a dental team from Two Harbors, Minnesota in March that included his wife, Karen and Shawn Dahlgren. They did \$12,000 of free dental care for our kids!
