Young people with special needs, like Ginda, can be loved, accepted and challenged to reach their potential. About 15-20% of our children have special needs, ranging from cerebral palsy to brain damage.



Sibling groups can stay together. About 60% of our children are siblings, and CSC works to keep these families intact, both in coming to live with us, and in their eventual adoptions.



Children can learn about Jesus Christ and what it means to have a personal relationship with Him. Prayer, devotions, Christian education and church attendance are all important parts of CSC's program.

Is That My Mother? by Mitch Ohlendorf, Executive Director

The smiles one sees when around our children tell a lot about their attitudes towards life. They are resilient and they grasp what has been offered to them. With some encouragement they make the most of life. I suppose that is why the most common remark heard from visitors to our shelter and school is that our children seem so happy. It's a comment we love to hear, and there is a great amount of truth to it. But it comes with a caveat. There are often complex layers beneath the surface of that happiness.

It hit me like a ton of bricks. Having come from a very neglectful situation, she hasn't seen her mother in some time. It had never occurred to me that she or any of our other kids may be "keeping their eyes open" as they go around town. Perhaps she hopes to bridge the gap of those missing years if she chances upon her mother. Many months ago she shared some very hurtful feelings she sometimes has for this woman who brought her into this world, but then left her behind. Perhaps she would just like to ask, "Why?"

A few days ago I was having a conversation with one of our teenagers. In addition to my other responsibilities at CSC, I have the opportunity to spend a fair amount of time with this older set, doing recreational activities and helping with homework. Occasionally we get to chat, and the topics range from the silly to the sublime. Serious subjects can come up and it's not out of the question to be caught off guard at times. This recent conversation was one of those times and gave me perspective into the heart of one of our children, and perhaps many more.

It was a stark reminder for me of the pain so many of our children have experienced and the struggles they have in sorting out a myriad of feelings and emotions. I realized that being around these kids all the time, I also fall into the trap of just seeing their happiness. It takes time and trust to understand the layers below. But they are happy. Through God's grace they have come to a place where they have so much to be grateful for. They have a room with a warm bed and a home where they get three good meals a day and treats to enjoy. They have a place of rest where their wounds can be healed and their bodies made strong. They have a school where they can get a good education and a chance to reach their potential in life. At CSC they enjoy a community where they can come to have a

Canadians Help Build CSC, One Project at a Time

CSC has a creative and hard working group of volunteers in Canada. The Cebu Children's Shelter Society of Canada, incorporated in 1994, has been raising money for special projects in Cebu that have helped improve the services we are able to offer our children.

This year's annual Canadian banquet raised over \$40,000 for the construction of road access to the new property where we will be constructing two new buildings. The road is a crucial part of the project and will allow building materials to be delivered to the construction site without having to damage the playground. The road is currently under construction and is estimated to be completed by the end of September.

The 2007 banquet in Abbotsford, British Columbia, as in past years, featured a delicious dinner prepared entirely by volunteers. The program featured ministry updates by missionaries Paul and Marlys Healy, a video presentation and silent and live auctions. All auction items were donated by friends of the ministry.

Thanks to the loving efforts of the Canadian board and the many volunteers who give of their time and talents, CCSSC has made a tremendous impact on the ministry in Cebu, one meaningful project at a time!

One of the priorities for the ministry of CSC is finding staff members who have the skills and commitment to lead the ministry in the future. Our veteran missionaries, Sandy Swanson, Paul and Marlys Healy and Mitch and Ruth Ohlendorf, have more than 125 years of combined experience and have served the ministry effectively and faithfully. But the long term viability of CSC will depend on our ability to identify and nurture leaders for tomorrow. Succession planning is more than a buzzword for CSC. It is a crucial task.

God has provided three young people who are currently working in Cebu, offering talents, energy and fresh perspectives to the work of CSC. Amy Luck, Tammy Vosika and Joel Reasner constitute the "youth movement" on the Cebu staff. Each came to CSC by a different path, but all three have found a niche in the ministry where they can be a blessing to the children and make a significant difference in their lives. Amy Luck was one of the pioneer teachers in our Children of Hope School in 1998. She taught for two years, then spent three years in the states before returning to Cebu in 2003 and officially joining our staff. Amy is our pre-school teacher and helps with various administrative tasks, helping

out in the child development and medical areas when staff members are on furlough. Amy is energetic and dedicated, and has an intense love for the children she teaches and for all the CSC kids. According to Amy, "I have the best job in the world! What a blessing it is to wake up every morning to a job I love." Although she finds it difficult at times being far away from family and friends, she is "reminded daily that Cebu is where I am supposed to be."

Tammy Vosika learned about CSC when she joined a work team from her home church that went to Cebu in 1996. Later, her family adopted four boys from CSC and Tammy's love for the Philippines and our ministry continued to grow.

Tammy teaches the highest level students in our school. She is a talented teacher, a good faculty member, and takes every opportunity possible to spend time with the children.

For Tammy, working at CSC is a learning and growing experience. "Every day the kids inspire, challenge, encourage, humble, and teach us. It is such a privilege to be part of their lives and to help them prepare for an adoptive family."

Phase One of Building Project Begins with Road Construction in Banawa



The expansion of CSC's shelter facilities began during the third week of June when the heavy equipment arrived to begin excavation work for an access road from our existing property to the site for our new buildings. A fairly extensive engineering project got underway when we moved the small bodega in our parking lot, demolished our existing medical laboratory, and began to dig out hundreds of cubic meters of earth to provide the way for a four-meterwide road and retaining wall. This road will provide access to the adjacent, landlocked property CSC purchased two years ago. After the building project is finished it will serve as the driveway to CSC's new medical facility and residential home, which includes accommodation for children with special needs.

The buildings were designed by Alan Wright, the England-based architect who designed CSC's Children of Hope School in 1997. Our heartfelt thanks and appreciation go to Mr. Wright, who has donated all of his services to this project and created a beautiful, thoughtful, and practical design.

In addition to the construction of the access road, the contractors are also working on the perimeter security wall. We hope to begin construction of the buildings in September with a targeted completion date of October 2008. Many thanks to all those who have contributed to ideas for the design and the many donors who have given very generously for this project!

Siblings Chelsie (11) and John Henry (10) arrived in time to start the new school year at the end of


June. Chelsie loves school and is a good student. She is confident and has lots of friends at CSC already. She is learning about trust and is losing many of the fears that she arrived with. John Henry is very active and opinionated. He loves being at CSC but is having some difficulty adjusting to rules and schedules. John Henry has not had success in school before coming to CSC. He is a bit in awe of our school, but he is cooperating.



Siblings Angelica (8) and Sheena (6) also arrived in time to start school. Angelica, who prefers to be called Angel, is a

quiet and shy little girl who is still learning that she will be cared for and loved at CSC. She becomes fearful if she thinks that she may have done anything wrong.

She is quickly learning that she will not be hurt here. Sheena is much more confident and willing to risk "getting in trouble" if it means that she can play a little longer, or do what she wants to do! Sheena is in pre-school.



Justin (18 months) came to us in May as a very sick little boy. He spent almost two weeks in the hospital. When he arrived he was full of boils and could not even sit up alone. He is now

able to sit up well, crawl, climb and gets all over the house very fast in his walker! He is just now starting to take a few tentative steps on his own! He has a very sweet personality, he loves to tease and make people laugh. What a joy to see the changes he has made!



Angie (11 months) arrived in late June as a rather sickly baby. She has spent the majority of her time at CSC in isolation while her health slowly improves. Angie is alert but wary

of anyone new in her life.



Twins Crystal and Lavinia (9 months) arrived in early July. Both are quite sickly but seem to be alert

and are able to be comforted in someone's arms. Both girls are delayed developmentally. Some of this is because of their premature birth and some because of illness and lack of proper nurture. We expect both of these darlings to progress

quickly once they get healthy.



Siblings Janice (14), Junalyn (12) and Rene (12) have

lived with us for over three years. Janice is in her second year of high school. She is a good student and enjoys the challenge that school brings. Junalyn and Rene are twins, but are very different! Junalyn is a friend to everyone and is cooperative and obedient. Rene is friendly to adults but prefers to play alone. He does not like rules and works very hard to get by with whatever he can, without really getting in trouble! He is quite the "charmer," though. These kids would love to have a family!



Melvin (14) and Milbert (12) are brothers who have lived at CSC for almost a year and a half. Melvin is attending his first year at a private high school. He is an excellent

student and loves the freedom that going to and from school provides. He is quite shy by nature so making friends has been a challenge for him. He loves to play basketball with his free time. Milbert is a rather quiet young man as well. He loves drawing, building things, and discussing movies and cartoon characters. He does not spend much time in sports. Milbert works hard to appear serious, but he really has a wonderful sense of humor.
