The Boy on the Street by Mitch Ohlendorf

we put the finishing touches on our newly

dedicated facilities - a handicap accessible

infirmary and a third residence for children.

The little boy was there on the sidewalk all curled up inside his filthy t-shirt. He couldn't have been more than six or seven

years old. I saw him as I stopped for breakfast this morning before going into the office. Obviously in a sound sleep, he was only a few feet away from the morning rush hour of people on the sidewalks and traffic in the streets. Only pure exhaustion would enable someone to sleep with the torrent of morning rush hour noise all around. Nothing good came to mind about this child's situation - he was asleep on

the hard concrete with his arms wrapped around himself in an attempt at comfort. Hundreds of people bustled around him, but he was alone.

We see scenes like this every day in our work here, especially if we spend time on the streets. As we nurse children back to health, feed them, educate them and build new facilities for them, a similar mental scene is always there, reminding us what life is like for millions of children in the Philippines. And it is definitely there as



These new facilities. which will soon be open, have been a project of love for more than three years. Since the design phase began in early 2006, countless hours of manpower have gone into making them beautifully constructed buildings with plenty of space to care for Cebu's neglected and homeless children. So many people have played such a significant part in the fulfillment of this project, from the contractors and labor-

ers to the CSC staff. CSC owes a deep debt of gratitude to architect Alan Wright for his design and supervision work, all donated. The infirmary is now named after his son, Frankie, and for "all children who triumph in adversity." The new residence is named the Ronald Duterte Home, in memory of our dear friend "Uncle" Ron, CSC's board President for many years who was responsible for helping CSC become the respected ministry in the Philippines it is today.

I can say without hesitation that this ministry, the Children's Shelter of Cebu, has made excellence a priority. We make great effort in every area of our operation to do things with a sense of pride and desire for quality. I love that about my job.

Excellence is evident all over the newly constructed buildings, and the type of effort that went into getting them that way was just as impressive. Our field staff managed to get the important new facilities up in time for a deadline that must have seemed impossible to meet some days.

But I want the whole story of our building plans to have the chance at excellence. As much as our two new buildings are wonderful tools to be used to serve our children in a loving Christian home, we did not set out on a capital campaign with just a medical infirmary or new residence on the main campus in mind. We felt priority needed to be given to a specialized Teen Home, professional administrative space and to increasing the endowment for the ongoing operational needs of providing an excellent home for children.

I hope that these two wonderful buildings that have become reality are not the end of the story of this capital campaign. That new Teen Home and office, and increased endowment, are just as important today as they were when the planning began. It will take a miracle to see them become reality. Of course, stories of CSC's history are full of miracles. We'll be hoping—and working—for one more.




FINANCIAL REPORT

We are in the middle of a "summer slump" in terms of our general fund income. Undesignated gifts during

the first two quarters of 2009 have totaled \$665,382. This is above budget thanks to an unexpected gift in the will of a longtime

donor, but we are concerned with the recent trends. June giving was 32% under what we need to make ends meet. Our total budget for 2009 is \$1,292,000. We have used \$128,000 in reserved funds which leaves them nearly empty.



But right now our new residence is just a house. It's attractive, but it's empty and almost impersonal. The infirmary is well laid out, but lacks the warmth of children being nursed back to good health. In the coming weeks the new house will become a home and the new infirmary will begin having a history of success in making the ailing bodies of children whole again. Children's voices will sound through the rooms and halls, nutritious meals will start being served three times a day, and house parents and the CSC staff will help give the children the gift of family.

And perhaps there will be some children, like the little boy sleeping on the sidewalk, who won't have to

June of this year. We have used some reserves to complete our infirmary and residence, so we will need just over \$1,000,000 to replenish that amount, build our new Teen Home and office complex, and reach our goal of adding 635,000 to our Luke Fund Endowment.

Now God has given CSC more of an ability to let His little ones come to us. Because of the kindness and generosity of so many, we have an awesome responsibility ahead of us with these wonderful facilities, to stand between abandoned and neglected children and the terrible emptiness of the street.

What Our New Buildings Will Mean...



We will be able to handle more children and offer better facilities for their care. We will have facilities designed with special needs children in mind: bigger bathrooms, wider doors and accessibility to all areas of the home. Our medical building has six rooms for sick and isolated children, as well as a laboratory and a better office and supervisory area for the nurses. This means that when several children are sick, or when we have newly admitted children who need to be isolated, we will have plenty of room for their care. Having these facilities will mean that some of our sick children will not need to be hospitalized. Not only will CSC be able to say "yes" to more children needing our care, we will be able to do a better job of caring for those who come to live with us, particularly those with special needs or those who require medical interventions.

And These, As Well...



The next phase of our campaign involves the construction of a new Teen Home and office complex in Sun Valley. Sadly, some of our older children will not be adopted, and we need better facilities to care for them as they transition

to life in the Philippines. The new Teen Home will provide adequate space for study, recreation and living in a location that is convenient for schools and vocational training. Our new office building will be the fulfillment of years of longing for more space for our staff, social workers, and other administrative personnel. It will include space for record storage, meeting and interview rooms and, unlike our current facilities, will be entirely separate from the Teen Home for privacy and efficiency.

MEDICAL PRELIMINARIES

Before children can be admitted to CSC they must have medical clearance. This means having lab tests and being seen by our pediatrician, Dr. Oňate.

Before children can join their adoptive families they must get a visa. For those headed to the U.S., this means they must go to Manila for a medical exam.


