## CSC Responds to Referrals with Teamwork and Prayer

CSC receives referrals of children from many different sources. Most come from the Philippine Department of Social Welfare and Development, or from private welfare agencies. Having been in operation for more than 33 years, CSC is well known in Cebu City for providing quality care to children who cannot live with their families and need a loving home environment.

Carmelita Baya, CSC's Supervising Social Worker, receives many of the referrals over the phone or through faxes that come to her office. But aside from our social workers, many other people are involved in the referral process, as CSC decides whether the child or sibling group can be admitted.

These are crucial decisions, often involving life or death situations. Sometimes the children referred have significant medical, emotional or behavioral problems that need to be identified and assessed. And we always have to determine if we have the resources to take the referred child, whether it be available space, manpower or finances.

The process begins with a meeting of a referral group, which would normally include the social worker who took the referral, one of our nurses, someone from the

child care team and myself. If the child is older than four, one of our counselors would also be a part of this group, as well as a representative from the Children of Hope School. Each group represented would be asked to do an assessment of the child. In most cases

this would include a medical work-up, a check on the legal status of the child, and some type of developmental or educational evaluation. We would want to know as much about the needs of the child as possible before deciding. And we would want to have the assurance that the health and behavioral status of the child would not present undo risks to the children who already live at CSC.

These are usually not easy decisions for our staff to make. In addition to all of the assessment information, our staff members bring compassionate hearts to the conference table. We want to be able to say yes to children who are in difficult and dangerous situations. We want to take them into our homes and school and begin the healing process in their lives. We want to expose them to loving house parents and child care workers, to offer them counseling and spiritual guidance, and, possibly, to work towards finding them an adoptive family.


## Father to the Fatherless: CSC Banquet on April 28

And so, as an important part of the referral process, we pray about the decisions that must be made. We commit them to our God, who knows and loves the children more than we ever could, and who knows what is best for CSC.

Sometimes, in spite of our desires we are not able to admit a child who is referred to us. We have limitations that we must accept. It is a heartbreaking part of the ministry that God has entrusted to us. We have to live with the fact that, in saying that we cannot accept a But saying no is a necessary part of the stewardship of managing CSC.

Teamwork is important in the ministry of CSC. Nowhere is this more true than in the process of evaluating referrals and deciding which children we are able to take in. It takes the combined efforts of many people with different specialties and talents to make important decisions. Praise God for the good, talented, compassionate and prayerful staff of CSC.



Paul Healy tells the story of a praying legend who loved CSC. She was known to keep lifelong prayer commitments and had scuffed up knees from all the hours she spent in prayer each day.

I never met her, but I have a suspicion that I know others around CSC who are like her. The kind of people who pray for our ministry every day, who don't say "I'll pray for this" unless they intend to do so.

came to us at the end of January. He is a very smart little boy. He has adjusted well to life at CSC and is usually obedient, though he has an occasional streak of stubbornness. He enjoys playing with the other kids outside and is very active and healthy. He is learning to follow simple instructions from his caregivers.



**Denmar** (8), **John Robert** (6) and **Requena** (4) have lived at CSC for two months. They were referred to us from a downtown government center. They have each made a remarkable



adjustment to life at CSC. Denmar is polite and responsible with his chores in the Eicher Home. He is very sociable and always participates in activities in the home. He likes to pray in front of all the kids in the home. He loves going to school and will volunteer for duties around the home. He is very healthy and active and is a good big brother to his siblings. John Robert lacks the confidence of his big brother, and will cry when he is corrected for behavior issues. Sometimes he is hesitant to approach adults. He likes to play outside and is very active and athletic.



Requena is a very happy and affectionate girl. She loves to laugh, tease, hug and joke around with kids and adults. There didn't seem to be any period of adjustment for Requena; she just jumped in right from the first day, making friends and having a good time. She loves to talk. She does a good job with her chores and asks a lot of questions of her caregivers.

## A Banquet Story from the Pitts Family by Anna Pitts

In 2003 when I went to Cebu, little did I know all that was in store for our family. I was on a trip to pick up our little girl, Willa. Willa had formed a close bond with six little friends at CSC and she was the last of the group to leave. She was 23 months old and knew the names of all 35 people in the Eicher Home. Brian, 11, was one of her buddies who would carry her in the yard before she could walk. Brian had a smile that would light up the room. The fact that he was so happy for Willa leaving while he was staying pulled at my heart. Little did I know that almost two years later we would be returning to CSC to pick Brian up and bring him home to Georgia. Now our family was complete.



Spring is probably the busiest time of the year for the Pitt family. Every year we made plans to go to the CSC banquet but it never would work out. Last year we decided we were going, and that was that. It was our first banquet and we flew from Atlanta to Minnesota. The first morning I went down for breakfast and saw a man with his daughter. She looked Willa's age and her name sounded familiar. I had my

husband text me a picture of Willa with her buddies from CSC, and, sure enough, Deborah was one of the little girls from Willa's group. They picked up right where they had left off, were giggling, swimming, bowling and snapping pictures. They were inseparable the entire weekend. It was as if they had never been apart. Brian had a wonderful time catching up with his friends. I lost count of how many times he thanked me for bringing him that weekend. I am not sure who enjoyed that weekend the most, me or them.

Last summer I took them back for their first visit to the Philippines since they left. We spent three days in Cebu, visiting, paying respects to Brian's first mom's grave, seeing where Willa was found, playing with the kids and catching up with our family at CSC. We even got to celebrate a birthday party while there. You see, the truth is, when we adopted Brian and Willa, CSC adopted us. They are like our family, too. There is a plaque at CSC's school that reads "We don't care where you come from, but we care where you are going." It's true!

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

Over the past year, we have given much thought and prayer to how to ensure CSC's ongoing vitality as an organization. In response to the way God has blessed the ministry and CSC's growth, we determined that it was time to split the President and Field Director roles – both simultaneously held by Paul Healy – into two distinct positions. This organizational change equips CSC to retain strength and purpose in both operations in Cebu and in overall organizational leadership, inclusive of fundraising.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I am pleased to announce that Matt Buley has accepted the role of CSC's President. Matt has been with CSC for the past eight years as the US Director. Paul Healy will continue to serve in Cebu as CSC's Field Director. We are excited about the future of CSC and the ongoing dedication to serving the children in Cebu that we see from Matt, Paul, and all of our CSC team.

During the past two weeks we have admitted several new children to CSC. A couple of them are young babies.
