

-MEDICAL NEEDS AT CSC

CSC medical team has been very busy lately! Three of our children have had major surgery and hospitalization, followed by after care in our infirmary. All of them will need additional surgery in the coming months, and one other child will need a major operation, so the

equipment, surgeries and hospital stays. It's the one category that is hardest to budget for because so many factors are unpredictable. This has been especially true in 2018 with the three surgeries, lots of medical needs for children admitted this year, and other unexpected costs.

Traditionally, the medical budget is one of the highest expenses at CSC. We pay for doctor visits, medicines, lab tests, immunizations, physical therapy,



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she would need two grafting operations, and she underwent the first one in May. She was in the hospital for seven days and spent a month in our infirmary following her release.

She has had physical therapy both at CSC and at a local hospital and has had to wear a splint on her arm. She will need a second grafting operation in a few months. Mary Irene has been so excited about this surgery. She has had restored mobility in her arm and is able to run and play more easily now. She recently told one of our nurses that she is so happy that she is able to put her hand on her chest during morning flag raising at school, just like the other children do.

Rovilito also suffered serious burns from a house fire prior to coming to CSC. He had a grafting operation in May, shortly after he arrived here, and

we are waiting to see how his therapy goes before scheduling his next surgery. He might have a follow-up operation later this year. Rovilito has had a wonderful attitude throughout this whole process. He is thankful to be at CSC and grateful for the surgery to help repair his burn scars. When the nurse brought Rovilito home, his feet barely hit the ground before he was whizzing around the playground on the scooter and playing soccer. Imagine the joy when he is able to lift both arms to throw a basketball or climb the monkey bars again!

operations before he was six months old. One involved the insertion of nasal stents to help him breathe, because he had blocked nasal passages. The second was on his cranium. Recently, due to fluid build up around his brain,




the doctors decided that he needed another operation. So in June, Tom went into the hospital again for major brain surgery to relieve the fluid build up and to

help ensure that he would not need a shunt. His Cebu doctors were assisted by a team of neurosurgeons from the US who were here on a medical mission and agreed to help with Tom's surgery. If things go well with the drainage, he will not require further surgery in the immediate future, but that could change at any time. Thomas has had an amazing spirit through all of his surgeries and recoveries. He has dazzled the hospital medical staff with his charming personality and continues to be a walking miracle. He makes us laugh every day!

The medical bills will continue to accumulate with the follow-up surgeries and other interventions needed for our children. Little Jacob will require major surgery on his colon later this year. Like Rovilito, he is new at CSC. Sometimes we know that a child we admit will need lots of medical work, like with Rovilito, Mary Irene and Jacob. Sometimes it is a surprise to us. But either way, we want to be able to offer the best medical care possible for the children that live at CSC. With skilled physicians, attentive staff and loving supporters, we have been able to do that for almost 40 years!

Our team includes four Registered Nurses who work together to see that our children receive the best medical care possible in Cebu City.


One of our nurses, SenSen Baya, has been serving at CSC for six years. She has been an excellent employee with a big heart for the children of CSC.

One of the biggest tasks for our nursing team is the preparation of medical reports required by the Philippine government. These are used in the matching of our children for adoption and are very important. SenSen is the nurse assigned to writing those reports, which include records of immunizations, doctor visits, medications, and diagnoses. SenSen does an excellent job of getting accurate information

into these reports. Occasionally, she accompanies our children to Manila for their visa medical examinations.

One of the best things about SenSen is her compassion and love for the children. SenSen has a tremendous rapport with our doctors, her co-workers, and most importantly, our children. And when children are sick or scared, that relationship is especially important.

CSC is blessed to have SenSen as part of our medical team. Please pray for her and the other nurses in their important work.

-KIDS' KORNER

New Kids:

ROVILITO (9) AND TWINS NEAD AND NEAL (5)

have been at CSC for about four months. Their mother had left the home a couple of years ago, and their father lacked the ability and desire to parent them and provide for them. They were often left alone. One night while the boys were alone and Rovilito was making dinner for the younger boys, a kerosene lamp accidentally fell and started a fire. Rovilito was severely burned and was hospitalized for three months. After he was released from the hospital, the boys stayed with various neighbors and extended family members before finally coming to CSC. They were quite ill when they arrived, but they are now doing very well, thanks to the love and care at CSC!

JACOB D (5) spent four and a half years at a different child caring agency in Manila before he came to CSC. When he was just five months old, he had been found in a fruit carton on the street. At age three, he was diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder, and the agency in Manila searched for a different place for him - one with experience caring for a boy with Jacob's special needs. He came to CSC four months ago. Jacob also has been diagnosed with Hirschsprung's Disease and will soon need surgery.

REY MICHAEL (3) had been abandoned by his mother and was being cared for by his grandfather. The grandfather died in January, and Rey Michael went to live at a nearby shelter in Manila. That shelter has an age limit of five years old, and they detected signs of hyperactivity, so they referred Rey Michael to us. He has mild hearing loss in one ear and has a language delay. Both issues are being addressed by our therapy department.

We have welcomed nine new children to the shefter in the past several months.

What a blessing to be able to provide for these little ones!

JAIREH (21 MONTHS) came to CSC a little over three months ago. His mother lives on the street and could not continue to care for him. When he was three years old, he contracted pneumonia and was admitted to a hospital. From there, he went to a different orphanage, but that orphanage does not provide long-term care, so he was referred to us. Jaireh is in great health now. He is a cute and personable little boy, and we are so glad to have him at CSC!

PRINCESS (11) AND ACE (5) came to live at CSC in May. They had been living with their birth father. Their mother passed away a few years ago from pneumonia, and the father was unable to provide for the girls so he brought them to CSC. He wanted them to have a brighter future. The girls are very sweet and seem to have been loved by their birth family, despite a lack of resources to provide for their needs and to properly supervise them. The girls had many health issues, but we have been providing much needed medical treatment. Princess and Ace are bright young girls. We know we can provide a safe environment for them and grow their talents and abilities. The day they moved into the Eicher home, Ace said to one of our staff members "I'm here now. I'm here to stay."

JEREMIAS (9) is our newest CSC child, having been with us for only a few weeks. A concerned citizen had notified us that there was a boy in need of care. CSC found that Jeremias was in need of immediate medical attention after he was hit by a motorcycle that fractured his leg bone. We discovered that the boy's father had been abusive and was not providing for the needs of his son. Jeremias left his home and was on the streets trying to care for himself. He has been at CSC for only a short time but seems to be adjusting well. We are providing for his needs and working with him to teach him how valued and loved he is!









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
