



CSC's Children of Faith

CSC has been a ministry of faith since its inception nearly 32 years ago. Our missionary staff, who founded the work for homeless children here in Cebu City, were people of strong faith. That continues to today with several new staff members added along the way. A ministry such as ours that works among the poorest of the poor, with children and families who have faced many injustices, could not survive long without leaders who have a strong faith in a just God. Our work needs a purpose. Our purpose is to serve and honor our living God - a God who inspires and deserves a great amount of faith.

As a staff, we don't wish to keep this faith to ourselves. We want the 80 children in our care to know why we do what we do. We want them to know why we are here from a different country caring for them. It is important for our children to know we are away from our families for a greater purpose. Our faith in God brought us here, it keeps us here, and it enables us to weather the challenges and difficulties we face caring for children from abusive and neglected backgrounds. We want our children not only to experience the benefits of our faith, but we want them to have that faith as well.

Our children are at many different levels of faith, depending on their level of maturity. It is very encouraging that when we have visitors, they comment positively on

how our children know scripture and the stories of faith from the Bible. Our children benefit from regular devotions and prayer in the homes, weekly Sunday school and worship in a local church, and special activities such as Vacation Bible School and Bible Month activities at our school.

There are also other special activities geared toward our more mature children. On a weekly basis, CSC staff member Joel Reasoner leads Boys' Club for the teen boys. Assisted by our counselor, Eldie Allocod, Joel leads them in study-

ing scripture and relevant faith issues. Every Saturday morning a missionary friend hosts our adolescent and teen girls in Bible Club. In addition to regular Bible learning activities, a small group of older girls are also mentored to be Christian leaders. These girls, in turn, host a weekly Bible story in our home for the younger children.

I meet on a regular basis with our children who are matched with adoptive families and waiting to leave. We talk about many issues important to their adjustment in their new families and cultures. But we also talk about carrying with them what they have learned at CSC, including matters of Christian values, morals and faith. We don't want our children checking those things at the door when they leave.

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Magazine people say magazines are as popular as ever. Of course they would say that, but they have statistics to back it up. Evidently, people will sit a long time in front of an open magazine.

I'm told we don't read magazines for news anymore. All the news we need is on the screens of our TVs from 24-hour sources. The screens of our computers are even more resourceful. Apparently, we read magazines to reflect a little more.

If you had called me once a week during the height of our advocacy for the adoption law change that will keep siblings together, I probably could have given you new information during every call. There were so many little details and so many changes. I almost couldn't believe it when President Obama signed the bill into law, and our older kids became eligible for adoption.

By some miracle, and nothing less, all that work from so many people produced results. Then, more quietly, implementation of the law hit a snag and has only recently been worked out. Now, we wonder how to get over one last, very specific, hurdle.

The truth is, I could have shared every detail with you along the way, and you wouldn't know more than this: God was and is in control. It is quite honestly the only justifiable response to all that has transpired. Some might poo-poo that "Sunday School response," but they would be fooling themselves. This wasn't possible without God. Reflecting back on it all, I can see that clearly.

I won't give you any more details on the last hurdle. Such is the nature of our work. But I will just ask you to pray that our God would finish the good work He started in this, and push the final hurdle over...just as He has all the others.

I Got My Dream. What's Yours?

Hi, my name is Alvin Barton. I'll tell you about my life and how it was like being a youngest kid. Well, I'm adopted. I have 4 sisters, two brothers, a mom and dad and a dog, too. Back then I had a brother, a mom and no dad. Back then I was being such a naughty little kid. I was running around like a lion. My brother back then had a liver disease. I wasn't adopted by then. It was hard for me and my mom couldn't take care of me. I begged for food and helped my brother if he was in trouble. Sometimes I would run away from home and wouldn't be back at night. My mom was worried at me. It felt like she couldn't take care of me any more. I saw my friends making fun of my brother. I saw my brother's head was down. I was depressed. I was angry at my friends.....

One day as I was walking home I saw two minivans. One was silver the other like a purple color. My mom was talking to them; it felt strange because she wasn't always talking to the workers. As I came near my mom grabbed my hand and she mentioned that I was going somewhere very special, with the man my mom was talking to. The next day he came around noon and he was talking to me. He was a really nice guy. When I got there, there were two houses. It was huge. I had never seen anything with two big houses. He asked my mom if it was okay with her for me to live in an orphanage and she said that it would be the best for me..... I was 7 by then. They asked me if I want to live with them and a bunch of my friends too were there already. I asked about my brother and why he can't stay with me and they said that the church was already helping him but I still wanted to be with him. They could visit once a month.

That was fine with me. So they left me and my mom to talk. I was crying so hard that day.

As soon as they left I was standing there alone in the dark and there was a guy named Mitch. I asked Mitch why there were was a bunch of kids and he said they were either found on the streets or their moms couldn't take care of them any more and that was why I was there. So my mom couldn't take care of me any more. Mitch also said that some of these kids will get adopted to other parents. My ears went up. I said you mean kids get a new family, and he was like yup they do.

A couple of years I dreamed of getting adopted. When families came to visit I would be in my best behavior and the next day they would leave with a baby. I was crushed but I never gave up. When I was 10 years old I was tricked by staff and teachers who told this other girl and me to wait outside after school. I wanted to go back to the house. They told us to come inside and talk with them. This was very scary to me because I never ever been talked to before like this. They asked us if we knew why we were here and I said are we in trouble, and they shook their heads no. After a while the girl said are we getting adopted, and they looked at us and gave us a picture of the families we were getting adopted by, and I went to my knees praying to God, thank you, thank you so much for this day to come and the staff and my counselor were really happy. So this is why I told you my dreams. People out there, if there is a dream you want, never give up on it. Anything you try to accomplish, always try your best at it. I got my dream. What's yours?

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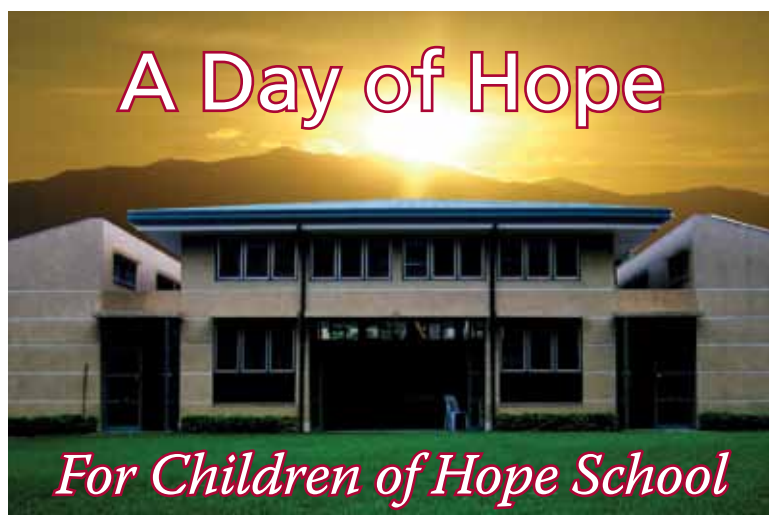
