"TODAY IS WHEN GOOD THINGS START HAPPENING FOR JOVAN"

Jovan was almost a statistic - another baby who died of malnutrition before he was a year old. If not for the grace of God and the availability of CSC personnel, that would almost certainly have been the case. But God had another plan for Jovan.

On January 11, we got a call from the daughter of one of our child care workers about a baby who

had been abandoned in her community. Our medical director, Marlys, and one of our social workers, Carmelita, went to see the child and were shocked at his emaciated body. They learned from community workers that the boy had been left by his mom, who was out begging for money to feed him as well as her

of Jovan." We could not begin to imagine all that he had suffered prior to that day, but we knew that CSC is place where he could get well, be loved, and enjoy a future where he would never be hungry again.

At 11 months old, Jovan weighed just 10.5 pounds! Within hours of admission, he was receiving medications for parasites, and

one-on-one care from an experienced child care worker in an isolation room where he could be safe, protected from germs and closely monitored.

As it turned out, Jovan needed to spend a few days in the hospital to receive antibiotics through IVs. On the day that

nine other children. It was clear to Marlys and Carmelita that Jovan was a very sick little guy who needed immediate attention. While Marlys was bringing him to our pediatrician. Carmelita tracked down the mom. She was thrilled to know that her son would receive medical attention and proper nutrition, and a chance to live.

The first evening that Jovan was at CSC, several of us huddled around him in prayer. "Lord," we prayed, "may this day be the start of good things in the life

he was released I talked to the worker who had been assigned to care for him in the hospital, and she told me that when she sang to him he would cry when she stopped. She reported that Jovan had started smiling almost immediately when the IV was taken out. Good things were already beginning to happen for darling Jovan!

I t can be easy to make one of two mistakes as a first-time visitor to Cebu: overlook the babies or the teen home. The school-aged kids at the main campus are so engaging that one can spend a rewarding visit focused solely on them. I, for one, have to make it a discipline to check in on the babies. Frankly, I'm out of my element with them and it shows. There have been infants that "smile for everybody" who look at me and bawl.

For other visitors the teen home is easy to miss out on because it's located a few miles from the main campus and school, where so much of the activity is taking place. The young adults living there are also busy and harder to track down. I have had the good fortune of spending a good chunk of my time in Cebu at the CSC office attached to the teen home, so I get to see them more often. They are wonderful young people to get to know.

Our most well-known teen home resident, Kirk, isn't even officially on the roster of nine. He's off in Canada pursuing a great education. As has been his custom, he continues to expand what is possible for our teen home residents.

Arlene continues striving towards her goal of teaching blind students music, Mildred works on her nursing program and Julieto learns what it takes to farm. For all the hurt our teen home residents feel knowing their dream of adoption is no longer possible, most work hard to make the most of what they do have. Meeting and knowing them is a can't-miss part of visiting CSC.

Year-end Financial Report: God's Great Provision

For ministries like CSC, the last few weeks of the year are crucial in terms of income. Once again, our prayers were answered in tremendous ways as we received gifts totaling more than \$290,000 during December! This brought the yearly total to \$1,213,305.

We received 6,770 gifts during 2007 from 1,526 different donors. Included in the yearly total we received \$112,151 towards our capital campaign and other designated gifts totaling \$22,892. In spite of economic pressures on the ministry in Cebu, we were able to pay all our bills and meet all our obligations to the children.

During 2007 we received \$111,504 in donations from 70 different churches that have CSC on their budgets.

CSC'S Dual Challenges on '08

Although the most significant challenges that we face are in the care of our children, the financial aspect of CSC also demands our attention and prayer. The staff and board of CSC are concerned about two factors that influence the ministry: inflation and devaluation.

Although inflation in the Philippines is not as significant as in the past, it does affect our purchasing power. As the prices of food, gasoline and electricity go up, our budget increases and we need to raise more money.

Inflation is a fact of life anywhere in the world, but it is more difficult to handle when the US dollar is weak. The Philippine peso has gained more than 20% on the dollar in the past year and a half, further eroding our purchasing power. So, we have fewer pesos to spend, and our pesos buy less.

In spite of these challenges we know that God will provide in miraculous ways in 2008 through our generous supporters.

Kyle (10), Cyril (9) and Clyde (4) came to live at CSC just three days before Christmas. They are healthy and active boys who are very polite and respectful. They are all in our school and have made an excellent adjustment to a different way of life. Clyde is in pre school and his teacher reports that he is very observant, watching how the other children do their work and listening to instruction. In the end, though, he usually has his own unique way of doing things. Cyril is quiet and shy but gets along well with his classmates. He struggles with reading, but works hard and likes to finish his work early so he can have free play time. Kyle is very intelligent and very mature for his age. He loves math and is very good at it. He is responsible and always shows respect for his teacher and house parents.

Since the last newsletter we have admitted 14 children to our homes. Seven left for adoption to the United States. We currently have 78 children at CSC - 34 in the Cherne Home, 35 at Eicher and nine in the Teen Home. Each one is a great blessing from God and an awesome responsibility.

Joevanie (16), Sheila May (9), Jayson (5) and James (1) came to us in early December. Both of their parents died within a year, so these kids have had a lot to deal with in a short time. They love being at CSC and




soak up all the attention that they are given. Joevanie has had to provide most of the care for his siblings since his parents died, at the expense of being able to go to school. He is studying at our school, preparing for entering High School next year. Sheila May is outgoing and happy and very eager to learn in school. She will need some major plastic surgery on her face in the coming months. Jayson is learning to share,

but that isn't easy for him. He wants everything that he sees. James was quite sick when we got him but is getting stronger daily.

Christine (8) and Ge-An (5) came to us in mid-January. They had been living in a government shelter. Christine is very shy but is making lots of friends in the Eicher Home. She knows how to read and is working on developing her listening skills. Ge-An is less shy than her sister. She is making a good adjustment to the different rules and expectations at CSC and in our school. Ge-An has a wonderful smile that we are starting to see more often as she feels more comfortable with us.

Our building project is taking shape. The land has been prepared and the building permit issued. In the past two months the new residential and medical buildings have started to go up. The footings and columns - made of steel and concrete -have been set in place for the residential building. The floor, columns, and walls of the basement are the current tasks for the workers on the residential building. The medical building is slightly farther along, due to its smaller size. The workers are already starting to prepare the roof beams of the medical building, and after that the roof will be installed.

In mid-January the architect, Alan Wright, came to Cebu to help finalize plans for both buildings. He worked closely with the CSC staff and the construction managers to update the blueprints. Alan was encouraged by the progress and quality of the work which is being done.

The Building a Legacy of Hope capital campaign is a \$2M endeavor. So far we have received gifts totaling \$365,010.
